THE DA SHORT HISTORY

DA'S POTTED (SEMI RELIABLE) HISTORY OF SOUTHERN FM

Southern Community Broadcasters Inc operates as a community radio station in Melbourne Victoria.

It broadcasts as "Southern FM" on frequency 88.3fm from 2 Parliament Street Brighton.

It is licenced by the <u>Australian Communications and Media Authority</u> to broadcast within guidelines prescribed by the <u>Community Broadcasting Association of Australia</u>.

Its purpose is to provide access, and be relevant to individuals and community organisations within the southern region of Melbourne.

Southern FM presents a wide range programs including general entertainment, magazine, specialist interest music and spoken word based programs. It includes a number of non-English speaking programs. It is a non political organisation which seeks to be inclusive and to cater for all ages, genders and interests.

The station was established as a result of the Department of Communications calling for expressions of interest for community radio licences in or about 1978.

Dom Iacono a former Board member of the Australian Broadcasting Commission was the driving force in the formation of the station. After enlisting like minded friends he, with the assistance of SCOPE an organisation created to assist and facilitate projects relevant to local regions, arranged a series of public meetings.

This led to the creation of the group in 1982.

The initial group included Jack Burgessan (former ABC engineer), Peter Wiesner, Wally Merek, Geoff Merrill and David Boag. They, together with Dom Iacono are credited with creating the station and to whom a debt of gratitude is owed.

All had technical skills. Dom Iacono, Geoff Merrill and David Boag were all to serve as presidents of the station. David Boag also assumed much of the secretarial functions including recording memberships, records and programs. Wally Marek was long time program committee member and chair.

The broadcasting and related equipment was originally donated or alternatively purchased or acquired from a variety of sources but often from the ABC.

The first test broadcast occurred on 10 March 1984 for two days from Caulfield Town Hall on frequency 89.5FM. There was reference to it "not being a spectacular affair" but important to demonstrate the ability to broadcast and level of interest. It set the scene for greater things to come.

The second test a transmission occurred on 18 August 1984 from the store room of the East Bentleigh Community Hall in Centre Road East Bentleigh.

By this time Daryl Pitman later to become a life member of the station, had joined the group and become the sports Co Ordinator. Over the years community sport has been a major focus of the station, together with specialist music, magazine and non English speaking shows.

Prior to the third test broadcast on 14 April 1985, Southern FM acquired its first permanent studio location. It leased premises at first floor 445A South Rd Moorabbin above the Salvation Army store on the corner of Railway Avenue.

Save for a fire in the Salvation Army store, that threatened the station on one occasion this remained the stations home until a move across the road to the Moorabbin Town Hall.

Peter Freeland and Anton Vanderlely were two members who joined the station for the third test transmission and were instrumental in the early days of the station.

Whilst Peter Freeland had an initial involvement in the station though his role with SCOPE, he officially joined the station at the request of Wally Merek to organise youth programming. Peter Freeland was also active on the technical side and assumed the role of station manager for a number of years. He was a committee member of the peak body for public broadcasting being PBAA.

Anton Vanderlely was a skilled and enthusiastic on-air presenter who was also a member of various committees with a particular interest in programming. He did much work in cataloguing music, recording promotions and training new members. Anton Vanderlely has gone to work in the radio industry.

Southern Community Broadcasters became an incorporated body on 7 January 1986. This was to formalise the ownership, governance and liability of the group. It was also a prerequisite to secure grants and to make application for a broadcasting licence.

From the first broadcast until being granted a licence to operate on a full time basis there were some fourteen test transmissions ranging in length from a few days to three weeks.

It is fair to say there was a degree of frustration as to the time to secure a full licence. Eventually applications for a broadcasting licence were formally requested in 1989.

After lodgement of the application for a licence, a hearing of the Australian Broadcasting Tribunal was held at the World Trade Centre on 26 March 1989. Southern FM was represented by Geoff Merrill (President), David Andrew, David Boag, Bronwyn Brice, Peter Freeland, Daryl Pitman, Annie Sefky & Anton Vanderlely.

Subject to some modest alterations to the constitution, the application was successful. It took a further eight months for a warrant to issue which is the formal permission to broadcast. This occurred in November 1990. Since that time Southern FM has broadcast on a full time basis on frequency 88.3FM.

A formal opening of the station occurred in 1991 at a function at the Moorabbin Hotel which was then on the corner of South Road and Nepean Highway. The guests of honour being journalist Lawrence Money & Greg Evans of radio and TV fame.

An initial challenge was to attract sufficient presenters with a range of interests and backgrounds to broadcast on a full time basis. A far cry from the current situation.

In the formative years of the station, there was lively debate as to its direction in terms of the style of music and magazine programs. Some founding members gravitated to Golden Days Community radio station and others to more youth orientated and progressive music stations.


Over the years, the studios have variously been located at South Road Moorabbin, the Moorabbin Town Hall, 22 Balcombe Road Beaumaris and now is currently at 2 Parliament Street Brighton.

Southern FM currently broadcasts on a twenty four hour basis. It continues to provide information and entertainment relevant to the southern suburbs of Melbourne. New members and presenters are always welcome.

Response is 'amazing'

THE encouraging public response to Southern Community Broadcasters' (SCB) plan to establish a community FM radio station based in the southern suburbs, has resulted in a public meeting being called at the Uniting Church Hall at 497 Centre Rd in Bentleigh on March 2.

Radio group tune up its submissior

DOM Iacono, of East Bentleigh, is a frustrated radio man from way back.

Perhaps that's one reason why he is fighting so hard for the establishment of a community-based public radio station for Moorabbin and its surrounding suburbs.

Dom is the driving force behind the Southern Com-munity Broadcasters' submission to the Federal Government for a public broadcasting licence.

The station, to be on the FM hand, would broadcast through Caulfield, Brighton, Moorabbin, Sandringham, Oakleigh and Mordialloc.

The Minister for Communications, Mr Duffy, will eventually invite applications for a certain number of licences in Vic-

"At the public inquiry for the licences, we'll have to show there is an established need for a

third arm of broad-casting," Dom said. (National and state radio are the first and second arms).

"The Moorabbin application is well advanced, and lengthy, and it will be completed within another month."

Much of the work of preparing the submission has fallen on Dom, by his own choice.

"I haven't been too keen to delegate any part of the submission because of my own initial interest and drive on the project.

"I have in my mind what the group is about. But I'm not dominating it; my work is subject to vetting before it goes out.

"The group is non-political and non-sectarism, and I do not want anyone to get in and manipulate it," Dom said.

Dom was full of praise

for the other members of the group, particularly the younger members, many of whom are media students.

SCB will be hoping to brandcast from facilities at Moorabbin College of TAFE, which has indicated the group is welcome to use its equipment and technical

Its programming format will be based partly on music, but mostly on allowing local groups and people access to the broadcasting facility.

"Our overall objective is to be informative, to educate broadly, assist the disadvantaged, and add to the cultural and artistic environment."

Suburban radio group goes to air

MOCOIE

In a few poky rooms above a thrift shop and a take-may hamburger place, a group of locals are setting up a radio station.

Their equipment is old, but adequate, most of it ex-ABC. A guest footballer once said he hadn't been in a station like it since the 1940s.

Atthough SSCB (Boothern Community Brondcasteral lacks the high-tech sophistical bave no need for fancy larges, grilling interviews or the latest equipment.

They are only aiming at the southern community, providing a service similar to that of a local newspaper — to inform of local events.

SSCB is one of several Melbourne community radio stations vying for a public broadcasting lecence from the Federal Government's Department of Communications.

sions since it began in De-cember 1982, becoming more adventurous with each test. The first was pre-recorded at the Caulfield Town Hall over two days.

The fourth test, in September, will be live for a week's duration, 24 hours a day.

Chairman of 38GB and re-source operations manager at Control Data, Mr Geoff Mer-rill, said the response, both from listeners and volunteers, has been promising.

We have had a very successful run so far," he said. The station covers a wide range of topics, with its major restriction being that it is limited to covering only local events.

"To have a local commun-ity station, you have to deal with local matters rather

than State or Federal mat-ters," Mr Merrill said.

The station covers, among other topics, news, sport, finance, the arts, music, history and gardening.

Despite funding from sponsorship and some government departments, 38CB is, according to Mr Merrill, just "getting by.

They have \$20,000 worth of equipment at their Moorabilin premises, most of which is purchased from the ABC or donated by members.

OUTHERN Community Broadcasters, a locally based group, is currently preparing a submission to obtain a public radio licence to serve this district.

This move prompted Moorabbin's city historian, Mr Tom Sheehy, to report that broadcasting suburban stations looked like being a reality in 1925 when a licence was granted to a Brighton company.

"The licence was granted to the World Record Company (no connection with the company of that name today)," said Tom. "Their station was 3TV which was ready to operate from premises in Bay St., Brighton."

Except for a few tests, the station never went to air due to a change in the Broadcasting Act when the newly formed Australian Broadcasting Corporation bought 3LO as a publicly owned station.

The group has recently received permission from the Australian Broadcasting Tribunal to conduct a test transmission on Saturday and Sunday, March 10 and 11, from December of 1982. It has a seven member Board of Management and three committees: Public Relations, Programming and Test Transmission Coordination. All of these areas need community support and representatives of community groups and interested individuals are invited to become a part of the team.

The group has already received some support for their activities. The Department of Communication has given them a grant of \$2000 towards the purchase of equipment and the Department of Youth Sport and Recreation has responded with a Recreation Initiative Grant of \$500.

Southern FM set to go public

SOUTHERN FM is likely to become a public radio station in its own right.

The Federal Govern-ment recently intro-

duced a southern sub-urbs station and invited local radio groups to ap-ply for the licence. The new licence, one of eight new public radio stations in Melbourne,

covers Moorabbin, Oakleigh, Mordialloc, Brighton, Caulfield, Malvern, Sandringham, Prahran and St Kilda.

Federal Transport and Communications Minister Mr Ralph Willis said the Australian Broadcasting Tribunal would issue the licence following a public inquiry to establish the most suitable applicant.

Southern FM station manager Peter Freeland said the station, with 14 test transmissions under its belt, would win the licence because it had a proven track record of public demand and interest.

The South Rd station has been operating with volunter staff on a shoestring budget since the late 1970s.

A haunt of local amateur announcers, Southern FM may relinquish

its cramped quarters for serious studio equipment if it wins the licence.

Mr Freeland said the station prided itself on strong community ties and not being burdened with a commercial problem of bowing to advertiser's demands.

But no advertising often meant being strapped for funds and a government licence did not guaranteee extra government cash, he add a little station to concil, CSV, and the Public Broadcasting Foundation, the real financial backers were the station hands and listeners.

"To run the station feasibly, we need at least \$70,000, so we need even more funding through membership, donations and sponsors," he said.

Regional radio ready for the airwaves

AFTER a decade of planning, the South Eastern and bayside suburbs will soon be listening to the sounds of their own FM radio station, Southern FM.

FM. Station Manager Peter Freeland said Southern FM has finally been granted a permanent licence by the Department of Communications after a 10 year wait.

Due to start broadcast-Due to start broadcast-ing in September, the sta-tion is still waiting on a warrant from the Depart-ment, Mr Freeland said. Eager to get the project off the ground, he said the station intends running a test broadcast for two

weeks beginning June 4 to encourage volunteers.

"It's a trial run to see what things will be like when we go full-time," Mr Freeland said.

He said the station already has hundreds of volunteers but that's still not enough to run a fulltime service.

"We are hoping to eventually get 400 people on a regular basis — com-ing in at least once a month and to be doing something," Mr Freeland said.

"We give volunteers training in the use of equipment, interviewing, editing, writing and program structures — all sorts of things."

He said the idea behind Southern FM is to give radio facilities to people and organisations within the southern suburbs to convey their knowledge to other people in the community.

"We have been granted a 'C' class licence catering for the needs of the com-munity and not a special-ist licence," Mr Freeland

He said the community He said the community based radio station, whose broadcasts can be heard throughout the south east from Brighton. St Kilda and Sandringham to Caulfield, Prahran and Malvern, is the equivalent of local newspapers. papers.

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

Southern station joins 'big boys'

FOR Peter Freeland, the sweaty brow he got from worrying about the technicalities of the event didn't really matter.

He was witnessing the realisation of a seven-year dream—Southern FM had joined the big boys' radio league.

On Tuesday night last week an assortment of local identities and station faithful clinked their glasses in recognition of the humble South Rd station which has grappled with red tape since it first went on air.

Television identity

since it first went on air.

Television identity Greg Evans launched the station, which is notched at 88.3 on the dial.

Southern FM has come a long way since the first test broadcast in 1984 from a meeting room in Caulfield Town Hall with borrowed equipment.

Six months later there was another test in East Bentleigh. The present studios in South Rd were made home and in 1988 a transmitter was fitted in the clock tower of

the Moorabbin Town Hall.

In September last year, things weren't looking so rosy.

Southern FM was scheduled to take to the airwaves in early September, but blamed a snall-like attitude of the Department of Communications for the costly delay.

The station waited

The station waited months for final approval on station format despite being granted a licence by the Australian Broadcasting Tribunal in April 1990.

At this stage, Mr Freeland feared the station would lose valuable local business sponsors as well as frustrated volunteers who formed the backbone of the South Rd broadcaster.

"In business terms, if we were a business, we would be looking at bankruptey,"

But the Federal Government "came through with the goods" by sanctioning the licence and format, ensuring Southern FM a permanent radio slot.

ANNUAL REPORT EDITION

At this time of the year it may be worthwhile to look back and review what has happened over the last twelve months. There was something of a slow start regarding test broadcasts as the first was not held until May but during that time SCB were able to move into the premises in South Road and that was surely a major event. The building we currently occupy has proved to be one of the best moves we made. By moving to a fixed address we were able to have much better control over studio and equippose?

The first test this year was very successful with many community groups taking pert and all reporting their continued support. In the period between the first test and the second in September, the activity continued with increased training and a large amount of recording hairs along for Sectimber.

For the Soptember test we were able to have the services of some professionals apparainced in telephone interview and this combined with increased power and a 24 hour program a first fer us - made for a really exciting transmission. The September test was also nostable for raising a significant amount of money During the test over 150 occole participated on air and the feeling in the community was certainly one of support for community breakdestiff.

Southern Community, Broadcasters is now incorporated. This is important as grants from various Government bodies will only be available to incorporated groups. Also a broadcasting licence can only be held by an incorporated group.

There is no doubt that as far as community involvement goes SCB has don better than any other station attempting to become licenced. We have one 50 community group participating in our broadcasts and is an indication on both the hard work done by some mem



Southern Community Broadcasters Inc. seeks a Category 'C' public broadcast licence to serve the southern region to provide a voice for local community and service organisations and members of the public, who in normal circumstances are denied ready access to both the printed and electronic media. Southern Community Broadcasters Inc. should not be seen as being in competition with commercial broadcasting stations but to complement and supplement existing services, and supports the concept and value to the community of public radio which is to provide a local community service which will greatly add to the overall education and personal development of the community.

Southern Community Broadcasters Inc. feel that a community radio station would build on and develop the already existing regional identities of Moorabbin, Brighton, Sandringham and parts of Oakleigh, which had its historical beginnings under the same local government area in the early 1860's. Added to these now are the municipalities of Caulfield, Malvern, St. Kilda, and Prahran. Southern Community Broadcasters Inc. wish to contribute to the cultural and artistic appreciation of our listeners in these areas, and acknowledges the need for greater community participation in discussion and debate on a wide range of social and socio-economic issues.

The whole of the programming policy is based on the general philosophy of people coming together individually and/or in groups and sharing their skills and experiences. The emphasis on local content and regard for the needs of the local community would include programmes looking at local government and services, to encourage a greater understanding between Councils and residents with the flow of information. Similarly, programmes to include explanation of the various forms of assistance available from State and Commonwealth Governments.

Within our region there are large numbers of citizens with widely differing ethnic and cultural backgrounds. Southern Community Broadcasters Inc. seeks to obtain the support of the ethnic community and encourage appropriate programmes to ensure a greater understanding between both Australian born and foreign-born citizens.

An essential part of our programming will involve the younger generation, and assistance and participation of schools and pupils will be sought in the development and production of programmes of interest to both the younger and older generations. In the region to be covered by our operations are a number of theatrical drama and musical groups which will be promoted to expose to the listening audience the talents of local performers, and to feature musical composition by Australians. An integral part of our music programming will also be recorded music covering a wide range from jazz, modern pop, light classical.

Spoken word programming includes looking at local issues of the day, to involve participation from local newspapers, provide advice on budgeting, investment and legal matters; developing production of programmes covering topics such as health and well being, that affect the lives of men and women, as a way to improve the quality of life. A sporting service, with information on various recreational activities, will be provided emphasising local sporting events.

In addition to local news, we see and accept an obligation to provide our listeners with daily news bulletins of a more general nature to cover important Australian and overseas events.

Programming of a religious nature, it is hoped, will present a broad perspective yet enlighten and entertain.

Bronwen



Peter was appointed as station manager in July 1988, however he also works part time in the record industry as a disc cutting engineer.


Peter's background is basically from community development, with experience and involvement with over sixty community organisations, ranging from community development, self help, to youth camping groups.


